- A similarity between like features of two things.
- The narrator or characters in the story tell readers exactly what is needed to know about the characters.
- A conversation between two or more characters.
- The narrator is a person in the story telling the story from their own point of view. The narration usually utilizes the pronoun "I."
- Stated clearly and in detail.
- A group of lines in a poem that look like a paragraph.
- The narrator exists outside the events of the story, and relates the actions of the characters by referring to their names or by the third-person pronouns "he", "she", or "they."
- A brief story in prose or verse that teaches a moral or gives a practical lesson about how to live one's life.
- A person telling a story.
- Narration that uses the pronoun "you."
- A character who undergoes an important change.
- A character who remains basically unchanged.
- The readers find out about characters through thoughts, comments, or actions of the characters.
