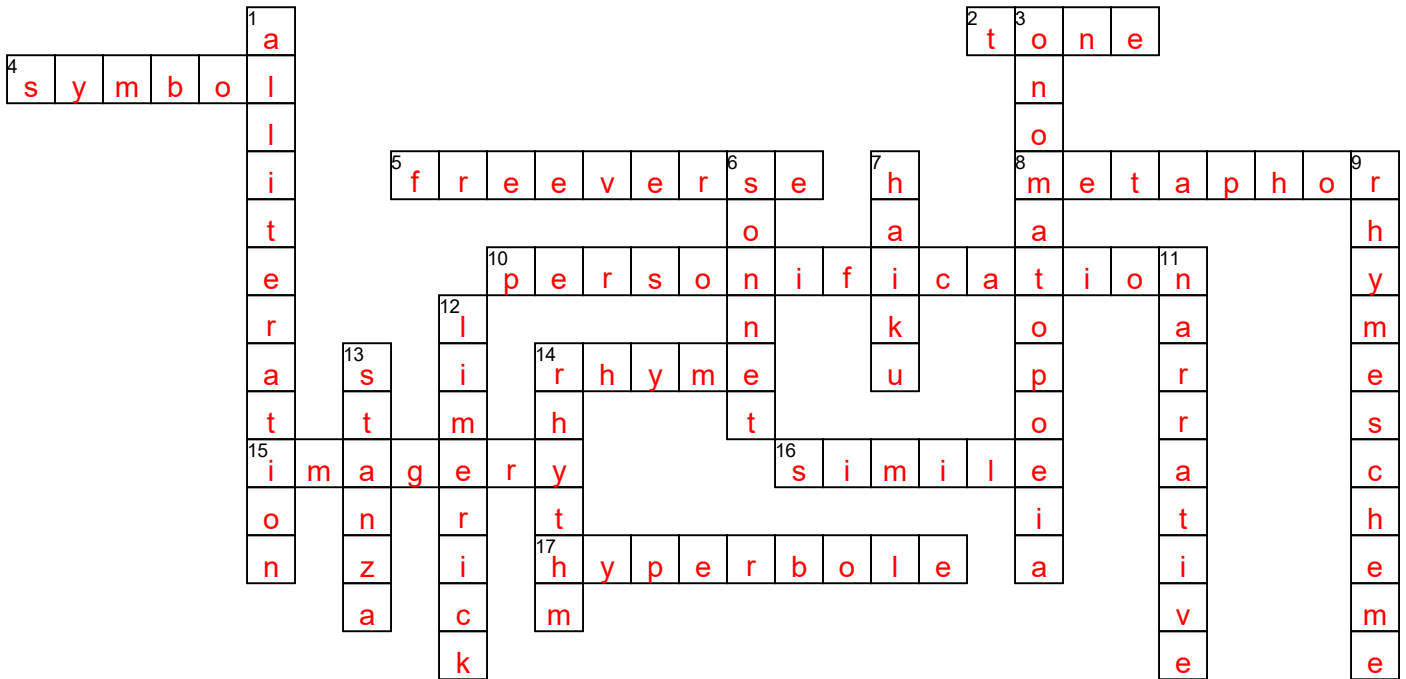


6th Grade Poetry Terms Crossword Puzzle 2

ACROSS

- The author's attitude or feeling towards the subject of the poem.
- An object or word that represents something deeper or abstract in a poem.
- Poetry that doesn't follow a specific rhyme or meter pattern.
- A figure of speech that compares two unlike things without using "like" or "as."
- Giving human characteristics to non-human things or animals.
- The repetition of sounds at the end of words.
- Vivid descriptions that create mental pictures for the reader.
- A figure of speech that compares two unlike things using "like" or "as."
- An exaggeration for emphasis, like "I'm so hungry I could eat a horse."

DOWN

- The repetition of initial consonant sounds in a line of poetry.
- Words that imitate the sound they represent, like "buzz" or "hiss."
- A 14-line poem with a specific rhyme scheme and structure.
- A three-line Japanese poem with a 5-7-5 syllable pattern.
- The pattern of rhyming words in a poem.
- A type of poem that tells a story.
- A five-line poem with a specific AABBA rhyme scheme and humorous content.
- A group of lines in a poem.
- The pattern of beats or stresses in a line of poetry.
