American Revolutionary War The war that led to the United States gaining independence from British rule, and the birth of the nation. 21. Civil War A conflict between the Northern states (Union) and the Southern states (Confederacy) over issues including slavery and state sovereignty. 22. World War II A global war in which the U.S. played a pivotal role, leading to the defeat of the Axis powers and the reshaping of the world order. 23. Vietnam War A contentious and lengthy conflict in Southeast Asia with a significant impact on American society and veterans.
