1.	Neil deGrasse Tyson	Astrophysicist known for popularizing science through books, television, and public appearances.
2.	Percy Lavon Julian	Chemist renowned for synthesizing medicinal drugs from plants, contributing greatly to pharmaceuticals.
3.	Shirley Ann Jackson	Physicist who became the first African American woman to earn a Ph.D. from MIT and conducted breakthrough research in theoretical physics.
4.	Mae Jemison	Physician and engineer who became the first African American woman to travel in space as a NASA astronaut.
5.	Charles Drew	Pioneering researcher in blood transfusions, credited with developing blood storage techniques and establishing the first blood banks.
6.	Benjamin Banneker	Astronomer, mathematician, and surveyor who helped survey the original boundaries of Washington, D.C.
7.	Marie Maynard Daly	First African American woman to earn a Ph.D. in chemistry in the U.S., known for research on cholesterol and hypertension.
8.	George Washington Carver	Agricultural scientist recognized for his work on crop rotation and multiple uses of peanuts.
9.	Roger Arliner Young	Zoologist and marine biologist, the first African American woman to earn a Ph.D. in zoology, focusing on the effects of radiation on sea urchin embryos.
10.	Daniel Hale Williams	Groundbreaking surgeon who performed one of the first successful openheart surgeries and founded Provident Hospital.
11.	Emmett Chappelle	Biochemist who made significant contributions to NASA's space exploration efforts, particularly in life detection techniques.
12.	Alice Ball	Chemist known for developing an effective treatment for leprosy, called the "Ball Method."
13.	George Carruthers	Astrophysicist and inventor of the ultraviolet camera spectrograph used in the Apollo 16 mission.
