1. Independence Day The day commemorating the adoption of the Declaration of Independence by the Continental Congress in 1776.
2. Thomas Jefferson Author of the Declaration of Independence.
3. fireworks Traditional displays on July 4th, symbolizing the rockets and artillery used in the American Revolution.
4. Liberty Bell Iconic symbol of American independence located in Philadelphia.
5. George Washington First President of the United States and Commander-in-Chief during the Revolutionary War.
6. Betsy Ross Believed to have sewn the first American flag with thirteen stars and stripes.
7. barbecue Popular July 4th tradition involving outdoor grilling and picnics.
8. John Adams Second President of the United States and a signer of the Declaration of Independence.
9. Philadelphia City where the Declaration of Independence was signed.
10. Star-Spangled Banner National anthem of the United States, written by Francis Scott Key.
11. Declaration of Independence Document declaring America's separation from Great Britain.
12. Continental Congress Assembly of delegates from the Thirteen Colonies that served as the government during the Revolutionary War.
13. July 4, 1776 Date when the Declaration of Independence was adopted.
14. Uncle Sam National personification of the United States, often depicted as a tall man with red, white, and blue attire.
15. patriotism Strong love and support for one's country.
16. Minute Men Colonial militia members ready to fight in a minute's notice during the Revolutionary War.
17. freedom Principle for which America fought for during the Revolutionary War.
18. Founding Fathers Leaders who established the United States, including George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, and Benjamin Franklin.
19. Revolutionary War Conflict between Great Britain and the American colonies, leading to independence.
20. Yorktown Site of the British surrender to American forces, effectively ending the Revolutionary War.
21. Stars and Stripes Nickname for the American flag.
22. Statue of Liberty Iconic symbol of freedom and democracy, gifted by France to the United States.
