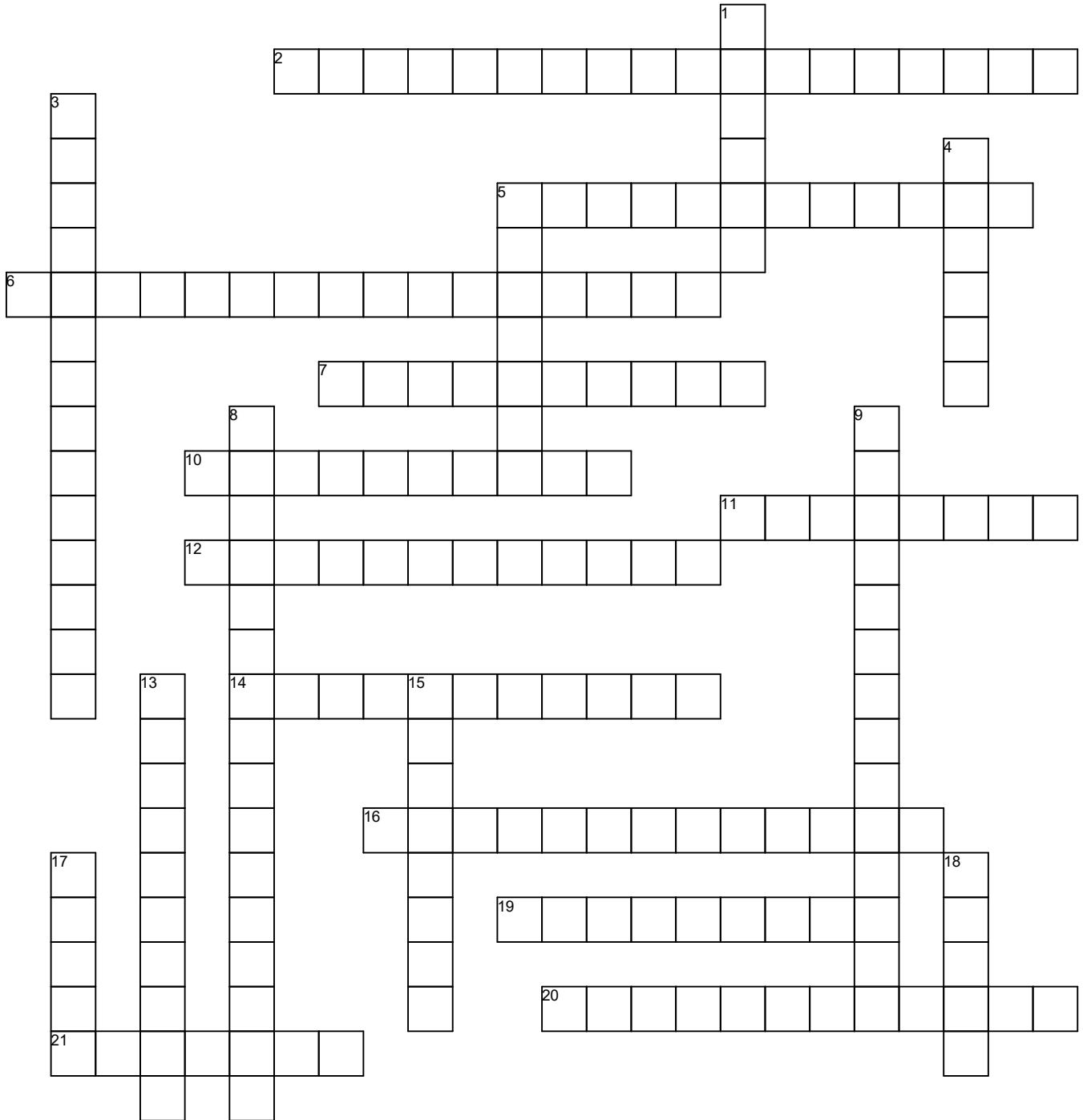


# Dr. King Crossword Puzzle
